When you filled out the survey, you indicated that you wanted to be contacted about your comments. You had suggested that more RV parks with full hookups on a bus line would be a way to help provide affordable housing in Longmont. We do have a couple of businesses that accept RV's, have hook-ups and one is even on a bus line. The Westwood Inn and RV Park offers full hook ups and daily, weekly or monthly rates for these services. In addition, the B&B Mobile and RV Park on Hwy. 52 just south of Longmont has full hook-ups, but is not on a bus line. I don't know the demand for these places, but they always do seem to be quite full. We will be getting a Super Wal-mart on the north end of town in the next year or two and I know they often allow short/overnight stays by RV's in their parking lots.

I do appreciate your comments and will add them to our Housing Plan. Hearing directly from people in the community really helps us to adjust our strategies to best meet the community's needs.

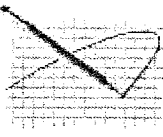

Here is a summary of how the city currently uses its CDBG and other  
funding sources:

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**Housing:** The city currently provides funding for affordable housing developments and projects. It also has a requirement that at least 10% of all new residential development be affordable. Approximately 600 affordable rental units and 130 affordable units for sale have been made available. Funds are made available for Down Payment Assistance loans. The city also funds a housing rehabilitation program to fix up the homes of low income homeowners, to make housing units accessible for persons with disabilities, to make emergency repairs and to paint the houses of low income elderly residents.

**Fair Housing:** The city will begin providing education about Fair Housing Laws, providing a place for complaints to be filed about alleged discriminatory practices, and will follow up on complaints.

**Homeless:** The city funds agencies such as the OUR Center, the Inn Between, the Boulder Shelter for the Homeless, and the Safe Shelter of the St. Vrain Valley which provide shelter and services for the homeless.

**Economic:** The city funds the Longmont Area Economic Council (LAEC), and Development: various job training and educational ventures (i.e. computer literacy, English as a Second Language classes, business training classes, etc.)

**Senior Services:** The city has a Senior Center which provides services such as health screenings, information and referral and

programs such as adult recreation classes, quilting, billiards and dances.

**Youth Services:** The city has a Youth Center which provides counseling services and programs such as the Neutral Zone, Ride the Rockies, etc.

**Neighborhood Resources:** The city provides resources and support for neighborhoods to improve, clean-up and get to know each other better.
